98-324: Spanish for Healthcare Professionals Medical Spanish

Course Description

As the Spanish-speaking population grows in Pittsburgh and across the nation, it is becoming increasingly more important for US healthcare professionals to be comfortable speaking Spanish. This course will combine independent study and interactive in-class activities in order to create clinical settings that will call for your use of Spanish. Our objective is to have students be able to comfortably communicate with Spanish-speaking patients in a culturally sensitive manner. In addition to basic language development, students will learn Latino social-cultural differences, and health disparities that disproportionately and unjustly affect the US Latino population. No Spanish prerequisites are necessary. If you are a pre-health student, a Spanish-speaker, or someone interested in gaining an incredible life skill, this is the StuCo for you!

Attendance

<u>Homework</u>

Homework will vary from week to week, but may consist of independent review of vocabulary terms through diagrams, completing short online games, reading basic medical documents in Spanish (i.e. medical handouts in Spanish provided by hospitals), as well as translating or summarizing medical documents' content.

Midterm/Final

The midterm will be spoken and will require the students to engage in a conversation with a Spanish-speaking patient (another student), and say appropriate responses in Spanish. Similar to the exam, the final will require

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the student to have a spoken conversation with another student and they will both be able to use as advanced vocabulary as they are able to do so.

Grading

Grading will NOT be based on Spanish knowledge. Grading will be pass or no pass based on the enthusiasm and effort provided during class participation and spoken exams. This includes making a consistent effort to attend class, as well as completing at least half of the homework assignments.
